SEX GENDER AND SEXUALITY Sensitization at Free State University Residences.

UFS Gender and Sexual Equity office invited Tholwana e Molemo to sensitize a male and female residence at South Campus Bloemfontein. Toka and Legae residences. There are LGBTQIA+ students who prefer to hide their gender and sexual orientation living at both residences because they fear stigma and discrimination. With the multiple recent LGBTQIA+ murders in the country, UFS took a proactive step to sensitize students to advance a culture of acceptance of the LGBTQIA+ community, especially in the residence where they share common living space.

The sensitization began with a survey to assess how much the students understand when it comes to the LGBTQIA+ community, with a special focus on transgender and MSM. For speedier results the students answered the survey with a show of hands.

After the survey, the advocacy officer conducted a Sex, Gender, Sexual Orientation and Offensive Words exercise. Students put a word from the list in the allocation they thought it fit into. This was followed by the LGBTQIA+ presentation as well as the human rights violation talk. It was explained it was important to give details when it comes to reporting HRV, the students were also invited to report any HRV they may know as a third party. Present members of the LGBTQIA+ community were invited to access TEM services. While allies were encouraged to be supportive of diverse sexual orientation choices.

The sensitization was followed by a talk and question and answer session with Tebogo Thabana a transwoman who shared her person journey. The students were attentive during her talk and responded with multiple questions. After the Q & A. The students once again answered the survey questions. This time the show of hands indicated that more students had a better understanding of LGBTQIA+ terminology and human rights.

Identified participants left with HIVSS kits. One client made an appointment with social worker.

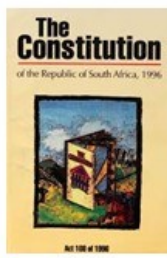

- Stay in touch with your primary care provider to ensure you continue to receive the routine care you need, such as medication refills, follow-ups and other routine consultations.



The Constitution in South Africa protects the rights of each and every individual who is in South Africa. The LGBTQIA+ community is not excluded in these rights.

Research has shown that one of the reasons why transgender people and men who have sex with men (MSM) avoid using health care services is because they feel degraded due to the stigma surrounding homosexuality.

The other reason is that they fear that their health problems will not be kept confidential by health workers.

Chapter 2: Bill of Rights

Equality

9. (1) Everyone is equal before the law and has the right to equal protection and benefit of the law.
- (2) Equality includes the full and equal enjoyment of all rights and freedoms. To promote the achievement of equality, legislative and other measures designed to protect or advance persons, or categories of persons, disadvantaged by unfair discrimination may be taken.
- (3) The state may not unfairly discriminate directly or indirectly against anyone on one or more grounds, including race, gender, sex, pregnancy, marital status, ethnic or social origin, colour, sexual orientation, age, disability, religion, conscience, belief, culture, language and birth.
- (4) No person may unfairly discriminate directly or indirectly against anyone on one or more grounds in terms of subsection (3). National legislation must be enacted to prevent or prohibit unfair discrimination.
- (5) Discrimination on one or more of the grounds listed in subsection (3) is unfair unless it is established that the discrimination is fair.

Human dignity

10. Everyone has inherent dignity and the right to have their dignity respected and protected.

11. Everyone has the right to life.

WHY DO WE NEED LEGISLATION ADDRESSING HATE CRIME?

IT SHOULD BE NOTED that the objective of hate crimes legislation is not only to prevent hate crimes (which no law alone can really do), but its enactment will enable government and civil society to be provided with vital information about the nature and prevalence of this type of crime, to help provide appropriate tools for tackling hate crimes.

WHAT IS THE PREVENTION AND COMBATTING OF HATE CRIMES AND HATE SPEECH BILL?

This bill is aimed at reducing offensive speech and curbing hate crimes in South Africa. The Bill was introduced in 2016 and sits before the South African National Assembly.

Some of the stated intentions of the legislation include to "provide for the prevention of hate crimes and hate speech" and to "provide for effective enforcement measures" against those who express their "prejudice or intolerance towards the victim." The Bill has been subject to much debate, with some groups expressing concern over the implications of restricting speech.

WHAT IS A HATE CRIME?

These are crimes committed against individuals or groups or property based on the real or perceived race, religion, gender, sexual orientation, disability, national origin, or ethnicity of the victims. The role played by these personal characteristics in motivating the offender is the key difference between hate crimes and other crimes.

HOW DO I REPORT A HATE CRIME?

You have the right to report the incident to the police. The police cannot refuse to serve or help you or turn you away because you are LGBTIQ+. After reporting the incident, the police must provide you with a case number and contact person. If you were the victim of sexual assault, such as rape, you have the right to Post-Exposure Prophylaxis (drugs that reduce your chance of contracting HIV) and the right to a medical examination.

If the police or health services refuse to assist you or do not treat you with dignity and respect, you contact one of the Love Not Hate partners or any alternative local LGBTIQ+ organisation in your area specifically assisting LGBTIQ+ persons with opening cases regarding incidents of discrimination or violence perpetuated against community members.

HISTORIC MOVE AS MISS SOUTH AFRICA PAGEANT OPENS TO TRANSGENDER ENTRANTS

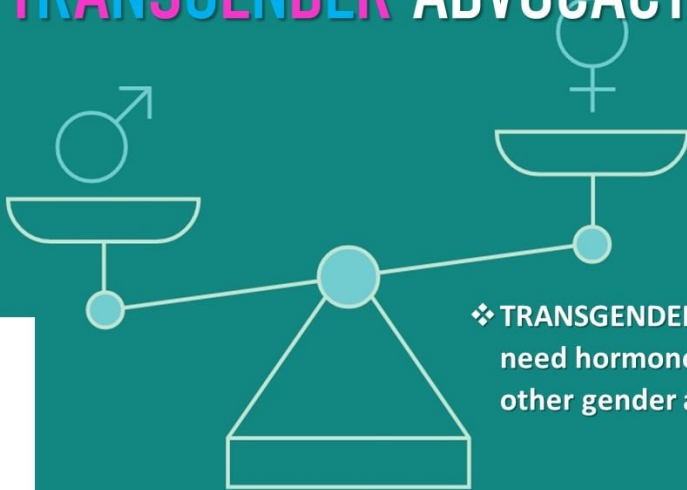
Since the Miss South Africa Organisation bought the license to the Miss South Africa pageant in 2019, Transgender women have been able to enter and compete for the country's most sought-after beauty pageant prize.

For the third successive year, Trans women are eligible to enter the 2021 Miss South Africa pageant. However, in order to be eligible to compete internationally, the contestant must be in possession of a valid South African ID document reflecting their gender identity alignment.

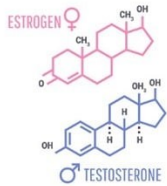
Says CEO of the Miss South Africa Organisation Stephanie Weil: "The world is finally opening up to the changing beauty standards and understanding that beauty is not a one size fits all. Weil believes that the Transgender issue has garnered so much interest this year because of the **surge of violence against Transgender people who are often are marginalised and stigmatised**: "The Miss South Africa Organisation is committed to continue to put a spotlight on these issues and create an awareness and conversations in hope of bringing about understanding and tolerance."

Earlier this year former Miss Universe Zozibini Tunzi took to social media to pay tribute to Miss Spain 2018 Angela Ponce, the first-ever Transgender woman to compete at Miss Universe also noting: "I just recently learnt that violence against Trans people has surged 266% from last year. They deserve to live a life as humane, happy and free as any other person. Stop with the violence! I'm gonna say this in case it has not been clear. Trans rights are human rights."

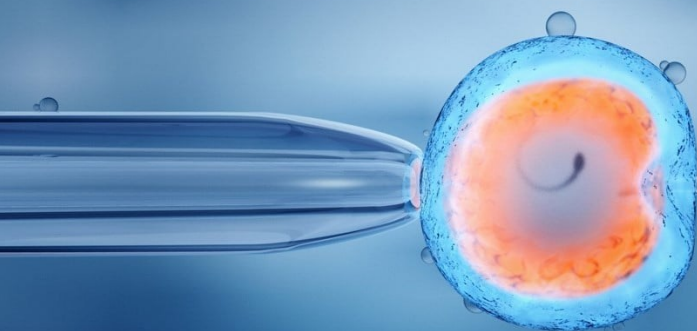

What have you gained most from being introduced to Tholwana e Molemo?

Confidence as a homosexual man, gained confidence to be myself and not to be ashamed of who I am. Regardless of how the society treat the LGBTQIA+ community.

What is the difference between a MSM (men who has sex with men) and gay men Society needs to understand that a man doesn't have to be homosexual to engage in a homosexual act, many people assume that men who have sex with men are all gay men.

What is the typical gay/MSM lifestyle you are aware of in the LGBTQIA+ community?

Gay people themselves discriminate each other based on their physical appearance being feminine and masculine.

What is the typical transgender lifestyle you are aware of in your community?

It is very difficult for a transgender to be understood by the community because in all honesty society is not entirely aware what a transgender person is.

How does COVID19 affect your life?

Covid 19 has restricted my way of living, I had to endure unemployment for the second time in my life, my finances have been sky up, in debt and worse in 2018 I lost my mother and that led me to depression.

What are your views on online dating?

Personally I feel it is good when you know what you really want on a particular site, but society has made it a bit dangerous for us.

What is your wish for the LGBTQIA+ community

My wish is that they reach their full potential. Wealth, success and growth, they must work hard to build themselves, never change for anyone, be true to yourself and always follow your heart

Coming out: As I grew older I just couldn't act straight anymore as feelings grew stronger and I became a bit more feminine than I initially was. I remember I threw a 21st birthday party and that was when my sexuality was affirmed after a gay friend of mine blew a kiss post their speech. I still never went to my family and disclosed my orientation, I just led my life until they called on a family meeting to address "the issue" and that's how I came out or was dragged out rather.

Please give us a background on your

Life: I was born in the 90's by a woman who was blind, I never met my dad and my mom passed away when I was only 6 years old, I was then raised by my grandmother, aunts and sisters. I never had any male figure within the family but because I was physically active and played sports I had coaches that played the father role in my life. I was really never short of anything as my family tried to make sure I don't feel the void of not having parents; which I'm immensely grateful for.

Childhood: Like I said, I played sports and I still am muscular, I had a number of heterosexual male friends and about two female friends, one of them was believed to be my girlfriend.

What does LGBTQIA+ Pride mean to you?

It means acceptance, inclusivity; it means being celebrated for my existence, it means leading a life of my own without fear of being judged, raped, ridiculed, chased away or even murdered.

Who is your favourite South African queer person and why?

Has to be Lara Kruger, she was the most confident person who also celebrated their culture and tradition with no fear whatsoever. Her resilience was just unmatched that was really inspiring.

Do you know your HIV status? Would you like to test for HIV?

I have not tested for a number of months now, but the last time I did I was negative.

What have you gained most from being introduced to Tholwana e Molemo?

This questionnaire is my first encounter; I am yet to familiarize myself with them.

What is the difference between a MSM (men who has sex with men) and gay men?

MSM only enjoy sex and there is no emotions to it, gay men are attracted to other men, physically and emotionally. Sexual orientation defines gay and influenced by feelings.

What is the typical gay/MSM lifestyle you are aware of in the LGBTQIA+ community?

They party as hard as they work.

What is the typical transgender lifestyle you are aware of in your community?

Usually into straight men, they always want their presence to be felt but look out for each other as well.

How does COVID19 affect your life?

Initially it was very straining as I could not go to gym or visit my friends but having to not be a work meant more time towards my studies, but now I am able to go to gym, go out, visit friends I am grateful. Still saddened by all the loved ones we have lost due to it.

What are your views on online dating?

I met my boyfriend on Facebook so....LOL

For us to love ourselves and each other so we can then inspire others to follow through, to not be ridiculed, but to be respected and celebrated.

I know that there are people who still strive to see and still find out that people out there are okay also doing follow ups.

What is the difference between a lesbian and a transman?

A lesbian is a person born as a female who is attracted to females. A transman is a person born as a female but doesn't identify as a female instead identifies as a male; however whether or not the person medically transitions is a personal decision; and doesn't state that the person isn't male.

What is the typical lesbian lifestyle you are aware of in your community?

Typical lesbian lifestyle I've noticed in my community is that most of the lesbian youth give up on going to school. Instead hang around with the wrong crowd, smoke drugs and drink alcohol.

How does COVID19 affect your life?

Financially it has crippled me. Because of unemployment I relied a lot on other people to assist me as I am homeless and unemployed and people had to attend to their own families and close ones.

What are your views on online dating?

Not too skeptical about it if you're very vigilant but because of the way and times that we live in, one never really knows other people's intentions especially within the community.

What is your wish for the LGBTQIA+ community?

That people finally see us all as humans worthy enough like all others. That even amongst ourselves that we love and respect each other for real and actually act like one family.

I started dating girls but also had feelings for boys and was afraid to date them, because I thought there was something wrong with me; and I also thought it is something that will embarrass my family.



What have you gained most from being introduced to Tholwana e Molemo?

I have gained a lot from Tholwana E Molemo, it introduced the services to me and I ended up being one of clients because it helped me to get PrEP.

What is the difference between a MSM (men who has sex with men) and gay men?

MSM are cisgender men who have sex with other men for fun or just to experience gay sex no strings attached. Most of them don't want to be known to the community. A gay man is a man who is attracted to other men physically, emotionally and spiritually.

What is the typical gay/MSM lifestyle you are aware of in the LGBTQIA+ community?

They are still stigmatized and discriminated by the community because of the life they live.

What is the typical transgender lifestyle you are aware of in your community?

I realized that our community doesn't know the difference between a gay man and a transwoman because people would usually ask questions like *why is this guy wearing female clothes?* Transgenders get more discrimination.

Do you know your HIV status? Would you like to test for HIV?

Yes, I don't want to test because I just recently tested.

How does COVID19 affect your life?

It makes a lot of changes in my life because most of the things I used to do I no longer do.

What are your views on online dating?

To me online dating is not good because you make love with someone you don't know.

What is your wish for the LGBTQIA+ community?

To be accepted in the community and be protected in our country.
